 Neither Timothy nor Gus likes to eat vegetables.

4. We will need baseballs and bats both to play the game.
 We will need both baseballs and bats to play the game.

5. I don't know whether I will drive or walk to the bank.
 Whether I don't know if I will drive to the bank or walk.

6. You either can choose for the groceries paper or plastic bags.
 You can choose either paper or plastic bags for the groceries.

7. I both have a brother and a sister.
 I have both a brother and a sister.

8. Would you rather see a movie or a play tonight?
 Rather would you see a movie or a play tonight?

9. I know neither Audrey nor Barbara very well.
 Neither I know Audrey nor Barbara very well.
10. I can't decide to wear the dress whether or the skirt.
 I can't decide whether to wear the dress or the skirt.
11. We either will go to the carnival or the circus.
 We will go to either the carnival or the circus.
12. Edward and Cameron play both hockey.
 Both Edward and Cameron play hockey.
13. It is not a rabbit but a hare.
 It is a rabbit not but a hare.
14. The movie will start at either 3 o'clock or 4 o'clock.
 The movie either will start at 3 o'clock or 4 o'clock.
15. I was nervous and both excited while giving the speech.
 I was both nervous and excited while giving the speech.
